National Updates

CONGRESSIONAL GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN — PROTECT HEALTH CARE & KEEP GOVERNMENT OPEN

Congress is in a shutdown (day six as of Oct. 6). Call your U.S. Senators and House member and demand a clean funding bill that protects healthcare for millions (ACA subsidies, Medicaid) and keeps essential services running. What to know: essential workers (e.g., border protection, law enforcement, TSA/air traffic control) continue working—often without pay—so travel delays are possible; some FAA operations are curtailed. Smithsonian museums are closed during the funding lapse. Social Security and Medicare benefits continue, but some SSA services like benefit verification may pause. USPS remains open because it's self-funded. Keep the pressure on—fund the government and safeguard the healthcare of millions of Americans.

EPSTEIN FILES - TRANSPARENCY NOW

Tell your Representative to demand full transparency: support H.Res. 577 to require release of federal Epstein documents and back the Khanna–Massie effort (Epstein Files Transparency Act) to force a vote via discharge petition. Survivors and a bipartisan coalition are calling for a floor vote with protections for victims and ongoing investigations. Ask your member: "Will you co-sponsor H.Res. 577 and sign the discharge petition to bring the Epstein Files Transparency Act to the floor?"



State Updates

SOUTH CAROLINA TOTAL ABORTION BAN (S. 323) - CALL & EMAIL YOUR SENATORS

S. 323 is the most extreme abortion proposal yet. It would: ban medication abortion and even criminalize manufacturing abortifacients (and distribution/possession for distribution when you know they'll be used to induce an abortion); remove exceptions for rape, incest, and fatal fetal anomaly; redefine "human embryo" as a legal person, threatening contraception, IVF, and miscarriage care; impose severe felony penalties on providers (up to 30 years if an "unborn child" dies); criminalize transporting a pregnant minor out of state to obtain an abortion; and gag doctors/advocates from sharing information online about how to obtain an abortion. Call and email your state senators today and tell them to vote NO on S. 323.

Local Updates

CITY OF SPARTANBURG ADVANCES HATE CRIMES ORDINANCE

The City Council unanimously approved first reading of a local Hate Crimes Ordinance. The ordinance adds a Hate Intimidation charge when someone commits an underlying city offense or a state crime triable in Municipal Court (e.g., vandalism or assault) with intent to target a person for their ethnicity, race, color, creed, national origin, religion, ancestry, sexual orientation, gender identity, or physical or mental disability. The add-on misdemeanor carries up to a \$500 fine and/or 30 days in jail. South Carolina is one of only two states without a statewide hate-crimes law, and Spartanburg joins more than 20 municipalities that have approved local protections. Second reading is scheduled for October 14, 2025.

2025 Election Update

Municipal, School Board, and County Council District 3 Special Election Tuesday, November 4, 2025

Early Voting for the November General Election runs Monday, October 20 to Friday, October 31 from 8:30 AM—5:00 PM (closed Sat/Sun) at the Spartanburg County Administration Building, 366 N. Church St., Spartanburg — Conference Room 6 (downstairs). If you need to vote absentee by mail, your application must be received by your county office by 5:00 PM on Friday, Oct 24 (11 days before the election), and your completed ballot must be received by 7:00 PM on Election Day. On Election Day (Tuesday, November 4), vote at your assigned precinct. Polls are open from 7:00 AM—7:00 PM. Find (and confirm) your registration, polling place, and sample ballot at SCVotes.gov.

Senate 12 Special Election Primary

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 21, 2025

Senate District 12 will face a special election following the recent resignation of Sen. Roger Nutt. In Spartanburg County, Senate District 12 generally covers much of the Middle Tyger area — Duncan, Lyman, Wellford — plus portions of Reidville, Moore, Roebuck, and the Spartanburg-County side of Greer. Check your exact address and district at SCVotes.gov. Because no Democratic candidate filed, the seat will be decided in the primary (and runoff, if necessary). South Carolina has open primaries — party registration is not required to participate (you choose which party's primary to vote in).

Early Voting for the Primary Election begins Monday, October 6 and runs through Friday, October 17 from 8:30 AM–5:00 PM (closed Saturday/Sunday) at the Spartanburg County Administration Building, Conference Room 1 (upstairs). The Senate 12 Primary Election will take place on Tuesday, October 21, 2025 from 7:00 AM–7:00 PM at your local precinct. If there's a runoff in the primary, Runoff Early Voting is October 29–31 in Conference Room 6 (downstairs), with the primary runoff being held on Tuesday, November 4, 2025 in conjunction with the General Election. The winner of the Primary will be confirmed in the Senate 12 Special Election on Tuesday, December 23, 2025.
